My Winding Road

I started my first business as a musician when I was 13 and taught music and sewing lessons to pay my way through undergraduate college where I started as a piano and organ performance major. But I graduated with a degree in marketing with a minor in music.

While my friends graduated from college and headed to their focused career, I joined the Peace Corps and went to Africa to help women develop food cooperatives. Later international work and travels took me to several other African nations, Haiti, Europe, and most US states.

After Peace Corps, I wasn't sure what to do, but later earned two master's degrees and a Ph.D. in Human and Organization Systems, focusing my doctoral research on women's leadership styles. Over time, I became a university professor of business, a faculty chair, and led major nonprofits. Currently, I provide workshops and consulting for nonprofit and business organizations.

It was through my women's leadership studies that I learned how seldom women find mentors to support their personal and professional pursuits. That's when mentoring others to reach their goals became one of my primary goals.

Creating NACWIB

Several years ago, major life challenges and changes inspired me to bring my work online. I wanted to create an organization where my background could assist a diverse group of people to reach their life goals. Having also been involved in ministries for many years, I created the National Association of Christian Women in Business (NACWIB) to provide mentoring, coaching, and inspiration for women of faith from around the world.

1. Remember, It's Not Just About You.

It's easy to forget that being confident in what you do is not about you at all. Being a woman of faith in business provides a unique way to show your confidence to the world. That's by being successful in reaching outstanding goals that obviously are not possible through your own doing. Working confidently in your business shows you have confidence because you don't depend solely on your own abilities to succeed. You know your success is supported by your faith and trust in God's help. You are open to giving glory and thanks for the confidence God has in you to succeed in your business calling.

2. Go for the Gold.

In business, it's important to maintain the confidence to not draw back from being competitive until you reach your goals. Women sometimes have an issue with being powerful and competitive in the marketplace. But business is a competitive activity. You must be good at what you do. To succeed, it takes the ability to know how to offer unique products and services, provide strong benefits to others, and be the best business professional possible so you successfully serve the needs of your target market. 3. Be a Decider.

Learn to make strong, confident, business decisions that others can depend on. 7. Understand Your Influence.

Being a confident woman in business means always keeping in mind the influence you have in the world. There's also that extra responsibility to always maintain a position of integrity. People watch your actions to see how you conduct yourself in the good times and bad. Rahab: Moving through Obstacles with Faith

Rahab was a bible woman mentioned in several areas of the bible, but her main story is found in Joshua 2:1-22 and Joshua 6. She was a Canaanite who lived in the city of Jericho and operated an inn where visitors would stay. She also worked with flax, a type of fiber used to make ropes and cloth. This bible woman would have been a successful business woman during those days.

Rahab was a quick-thinking person who kept her ears open and communicated with her customers. This is how she learned vital information from two Israelite spies that stayed in her establishment that the Israelite army would soon invade and take over the land. Using her quick wit in the situations, she prevented the two spies from being captured. As a result, she saved her life and that of her family members when her homeland was invaded and captured by the Israelites.

Rahab has much to share with the modern woman in business. Here are seven tips from the bible woman, Rahab, for today's woman of faith in business.

1. You can succeed despite your past.

Rahab was called a harlot in the bible, perhaps for her lifestyle or for reasons that are not described. Still, she had the courage to successfully operate a successful business and to face a dangerous situation by having faith in God. Many women have experienced difficult situations in life, and everyone has a past. Some have been labeled with a negative reputation or called names that are not deserved. Often, it could mean pulling back from society to avoid being hurt or ridiculed. But God is bigger than a title or a regretful past. Every person has a purpose in their life. Don't let a shaky past keep you from a pursing your calling as a woman in business and having a successful future.

2. Learn to effectively communicate with others.

Rahab kept her eyes and ears open while operating her business. When customers came in, she watched them; when they spoke, she listened as much as needed. That is how she knew the actions to take that saved her life and the life of her family members. Women in business must know how to watch and listen while doing business. Pay attention to others so you understand their needs. Know how to communicate well with people of all backgrounds. Communicating with customers, and the general population, is an important way to gain necessary information for your business.

3. Gain negotiation skills.

Rahab knew how to negotiate with soldiers and with spies in a life and death situation. From operating a thriving business in her city, she gained skills in making deals with all types of people. Business might require engaging in tough talks with competitors or adversaries. You might need to negotiate for supplies or over prices. Learn skills for making right deals and negotiating so you will be ready to use them when necessary.



5. Be flexible and ready to change.

Rahab could have ignored the information she learned about the upcoming attack on her city, or she could have refused to believe that the Israelite army would succeed in overcoming such a fortified location. Instead, she quickly decided to change her comfortable life to respond to what was going to happen. A businesswoman of faith can learn to be flexible in uncertain circumstances. She should be willing to make changes in her life and business according to the leading of God even when it first seems difficult to do.

6. Remember your priorities when things change.

Rahab could have saved herself and never looked back. But she had her priorities in order; she remembered her family and saved their lives too. Very difficult circumstances can occur and create a lot of stress in a business. It is possible to forget your priorities during these times if you are not clear on your values. What would you do in the event of a highly stressful situation? A smart businesswoman thinks through various ways she can avoid being caught off-guard by unexpected events. It is a wise to create a plan for business emergencies, so you are not caught off guard.

7. Use resources you have.

Rahab used ropes she made from flax that were on her rooftop to help the Israelite spies escape the soldiers who were searching for them. What do you have around your location that might seem useless or without multiple uses? Take a new look at raw materials to see possible creative uses for them or consider creative marketing strategies to get your business moving. You might have access to more inventory, ideas, and potential than you first imagined when you use creative thinking to view business resources in new ways.

Rahab's story is of a powerful woman who experienced the grace of God in a dangerous situation because of her faith and wise actions. Even though she had a questionable reputation, she choose to have faith in God, and became one of the matriarchs of the Christian faith.

She married an Israelite warrior and became the mother of Boaz, the father of Obed, the father Jesse, the father of King David who is the direct ancestor of Jesus Christ. In bible history, this means Rahab, a Canaanite woman, was the great, great, great grandmother of King David and a direct ancestor of Jesus.

By using strong business skills in a time of great turmoil, Rahab offers lessons for the modern businesswoman on how to think quickly when a bad situation seems almost impossible to overcome.
